About This Exhibit

The women featured in this exhibit should have been on the United States Supreme Court as early as the 1930s. Instead, they were shortlisted but not selected. Shortlisted: Women in the Shadows of the Supreme Court (New York University Press 2020) tells the overlooked stories of extraordinary women who appeared on presidential lists before and contemporaneous with Sandra Day O'Connor, the first female justice confirmed in 1981. Award-winning scholars Renee Knake Jefferson and Hannah Brenner Johnson cleverly weave together long-forgotten materials from presidential libraries and private archives to reveal the professional and personal lives of these accomplished women. In addition to filling a notable historical gap, the book exposes the harms of shortlisting—it reveals how adding qualified female candidates to a list but passing over them creates the appearance of diversity while preserving the status quo. This phenomenon often occurs with any pursuit of professional advancement, whether the judge in the courtroom, the CEO in the corner office, or the coach on the playing field. Women, especially female minorities, while as qualified as others on the shortlist (if not more so), find themselves far less likely to be chosen. With the stories of these exemplary women as a framework, Shortlisted offers all women a valuable set of strategies for upending the injustices that still endure. It is a must-read for those seeking positions of power as well as for the powerful who select them in the legal profession and beyond.

This exhibit, reproducing text and images from the Shortlisted book, profiles the nine women who appeared on Supreme Court shortlists before O'Connor's historic nomination by President Reagan and three more who appeared on his later lists for vacancies, along with five additional women who made it off the shortlist, four of whom were confirmed.

To date, only five of the 115 United States Supreme Court justices have been women—a mere four percent.
